Business Case Template (Word document)

Outlines the elements needed to create a strategic, economic/technical, commercial, financial, and management case for an infrastructure project.

Project Charter Drafting Tool (Word document)

Outlines the elements needed to create a project charter - a short document that describes a project in its entirety. Topics include objectives, key parties, governance, roles and responsibilities, ethical framework and communications.

An Introduction to Procurement Models (Word document)

Describes the advantages and disadvantages of different options for procurement – the process of securing support outside of an organization's staff members.

Cost Sharing Explainer Tool (Word document)

Describes an approach to a fair and equitable recovery of costs associated with an Indigenous infrastructure project. This includes identifying users (or beneficiaries) for both the construction and lifecycle costs of a project.
